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Impact Analysis Of Using The Name "Stockton Unified School District Department of Public Safety"

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1) LIABILITY & USE OF FORCE

Peace officers, who at times, must make arrests on suspected criminal violators, may encounter a higher rate of resistance to arrest over the questionable identification of their department. If the officers are not, or cannot, identify themselves as members of a police department, but rather a "department of public safety" whether this is presented by a uniform, verbally, by a patrol vehicle, or by reputation, can lead to confusion that the peace officer actually has the proper authority to arrest the suspected criminal violator. In such cases, the suspect may not believe he/she can be arrested and could offer a higher level of resistance which can lead to a higher chance of injury to the officer or suspect.

When force is used and Penal Code 148 (resisting arrest) is charged, a question can arise where the arrested individual could legitimately or reasonably doubt that the arresting officers are actual peace officers with the proper authority to place them under arrest.

2) WHAT IS A DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY?

Law enforcement agencies in California who use "Public Safety" in their names are almost entirely Police, Fire, & EMS personnel that are crossed trained in all three public safety duties (SUSD DPS being the exception).

These include:

Lindsay Department of Public Safety Rohnert Park Department of Public Safety Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety

As taken from Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety's website:

"The Department of Public Safety is one of the few fully integrated police and fire departments in America. Public Safety Officers are cross-trained as police officers, firefighters and emergency medical technicians (EMTs)"

To add confusion, Lincoln Unified School District **Department of Public Safety** operates in the City of Stockton and maintains a **security department** as their police department was eliminated in September 1997.

3) WHAT DOES CALIFORNIA LAW SAY?

California Education Code, Section 38000 states:


(b) The governing board of a school district may establish a school police department under the supervision of a school chief of police and, in accordance with Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 45100) of Part 25, may employ peace officers, as defined in subdivision (b) of Section 830.32 of the Penal Code, to ensure the safety of school district personnel and pupils, and the security of the real and personal property of the school district.



As indicated by the above charts, San Joaquin County and the California as a whole are retaining their officer numbers, while the Stockton Unified School District Department of Public Safety is trending significantly lower.

Before Name Change:

- 2018, gained 7 police officers while losing 6 for a net gain of +1, total of 30 officers
- 2019, gained 9 police officers while losing 5 for a net gain of +4, total of 34 officers**
- 2020, gained 1 police officer while losing 3 for a net loss of -2, total of 32 officers

After Name Change:

- 2021, gained 0 police officers while losing 5 for a net loss of -5, total of 27 officers*
- 2022, gained 4 police officers while losing 6 for a net loss of -2, total of 25 officers*/**
- 2023, gained 3 police officers while losing 4 for a net loss of -1, total of 24 officers*

*Several open positions needing to be filled. **Officer discharged but later obtained job back.

The general sentiment from SUSD DPS recruiters is that potential applicants do not know what the department is or what they do. SUSD DPS is often mistaken for school security.
